A 1920 Snapshot of Bristol by Harold Mitchener

During World War I, the Bristol Borough docks were large enough to create twelve building slips. In 1917, Averell Harriman organized the shipyards and created the Merchant Shipbuilding Corporation (later known as Merchant-Sterling) and would later land a huge cargo ships contract which would contribute to the war effort.

Many changes came about in the 1920s. On May 17, 1922, Bristol grew about 17 acres bigger. 1922, the Harriman section, was added with homes built specifically for an army of shipbuilders and located in the northern section of Bristol. The population grew to a total of approximately 10,273 in 1920 and acreage to the community.

The years 1920 to 1921 saw the railroad elevated and rerouted to parallel Route 13. Rerouting the rails opened the Borough to automobile traffic while allowing for speedier train traffic.

The Grundy Mill complex consisted of several buildings constructed over 55 years. Located in the mill district of Bristol, the buildings date from Bristol's critical period of industrial and population growth, from 1876 to 1930. The buildings operated as one unit for the milling, storage, and power for the worsted mills of the William H. Grundy Co and reflected Bristol's role as the premier industrial center of Bucks County.

Sirloin Steak - 20c & 25c a lb. Round Steak - 18c a Lb. Legs Lamb - 16c & 18c a Lb. Loin Lamb Chops - 20c & 25c a Lb." WEDDINGS. Miss Grace Alfaretta Reed, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. William B. Reed of Dorrance Street, and Harry Simpson, son of Mr. & Mrs. Harry Simpson of Edgely, were united in marriage at the home of the bride's parents at noon on Wednesday. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Charles E. Burns, D.D., pastor of the Presbyterian Church. Only the members of the families of the bride and groom were present. After a wedding breakfast, Mr. & Mrs. Simpson left for New York where they will spend ten days. HEARD ON THE STREET:

11/10 – REPUBLICANS WIN EASILY IN BRISTOL. Win Everything in Four Wards and Elect Councilman in Democratic Fourth. The Republicans won an easy victory in Bristol on Tuesday, electing everybody on the ticket in the First, Second, Third and Fifth Wards. In the Democratic Fourth Ward, a special effort was made to elect Charles A. Singer, Republican candidate for council, and it was successful. It is reported that all sorts of promises were made to induce voters for the Republican candidates.

KEPT WEDDING A SECRET. Bristol is a great place for "quiet" weddings. The latest of these affairs which have been kept from the public is the announcement which has just been made of the marriage of Earl Stanley White, manager of the Colonial Theatre of Bristol, and Miss Blanche Woodhull, the pianist at the theatre, which took place in Philadelphia last summer. The ceremony was performed on Sunday evening, July 23, at the home of the bride in Philadelphia. Mr. White was granted an absolute divorce from his first wife, Mary R. White, on the first of last March.

100TH ANNIVERSARY OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS. On last Sunday afternoon was witnessed a unique sight in Bristol when about 800 Sunday school scholars and teachers connected with the Protestant churches marched in a body to the Methodist Church, where a celebration was held in honor of the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of the first Sunday school in Bristol. John C. Maule, as a representative of the Society of Friends, read an interesting paper on the origin of the first Sunday school in Bristol.

NEW ERA DAWNS IN OLD TOWN. Pennsylvania Railroad Completes Over Million Dollars Worth of Improvements. New Elevated Line. Pennsylvania Railroad Company improvements in Bristol, representing an expenditure of over a million dollars in the building of an elevated line through the borough and the elimination of ten grade crossings, have been completed and traffic over the new line will begin on Sunday.

FRIENDS MEETING 200 YEARS OLD. In the old historic meeting house at the corner of Market and Wood Streets, Bristol, on the afternoon of November 19, a little group of Friends met to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the building of the venerable and beloved structure.

NEW RECTOR FOR ST. PAUL'S PARISH. Rev. F. M. Holden, St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Wissahickon, has accepted a call to become rector of St. Paul's parish of Bristol and will assume his pastoral duties on December 3, the first Sunday of Advent. The Vanuxen property at the corner of Radcliffe and Dorrance Streets, now owned by Joseph R. Grundy, will be the rectory and will be occupied by Rev. Holden and family.

STAGE SERVICE FOR NEW STATION. H. J. Molden announces that, beginning on Sunday when trains will be running over the new elevated line, he will hereafter have stages to meet all trains after 6 p.m. until the arrival of the "owl" line from Philadelphia. For this night service, a charge of 25 cents will be made. Charges on Sundays, day and night, will also be 25 cents. Prices for day service during the week will be the same as heretofore.

"A NIGHT IN BOHEMIA." The Bristol Lodge of Elks had "A Night in Bohemia" last night in their handsomely appointed home on Radcliffe Street. A vaudeville programme was given in the social session room by professional talent from Philadelphia.

LOCAL INTELLIGENCE:

A marriage license has been granted to Antonio Manzo and Francesco DeStefano, both of Bristol.Last Sunday was "sacrifice day" at the Baptist Church, and \$600 was turned into the treasury.

For \$1.50 a year, the Bristol Library will give access to 3000 books and 16 magazines a month, with the privilege of taking out for home reading a book and magazine as often as desired.

The first train over the elevated line eastbound is due to stop at the new Bristol station on Sunday morning at 7:12 o'clock. A new schedule goes into effect on that day.
