#### What to do this summer at BCHF

What that doe summer, There's no Gazette in July and August but that doesn't mean there's nothing to do. This summer, there's lots to do at BCHF.

If you enjoy history and attending our lecture series, we'll be having two presentations this summer. On Sunday, June 4<sup>th</sup> at 2 PM, Carol Simon Levin will be portraying Emily Warren Roebling who was a socialite, businesswoman, and chief engineer of the Brooklyn Bridge (1869-1883). Mrs. Roebling was the first female field engineer and later in life, an active supporter of women's causes. Ms. Levin's presentation is entitled "Bridge Builder in Petticoats". On Tuesday, August 22 at 7 PM, in collaboration with the Grundy Library, BCHF will host Michael C. Harris who will be discussing his latest book, The Philadelphia Campaign 1777-78. In 1777, the British general, William Howe, led his army in a campaign that resulted in the British capture of Philadelphia. Although Howe captured the American capital, the events of Howe's 1777 campaign ultimately led to America's victory in Revolutionary War.

If car shows are up your alley, we'll be having 3 this summer! On Wednesday, June 7 and August 16 from 5 to 8, cars of every type will be displayed in the parking lot behind Mill Street followed by a police led "car cruise" down Radcliffe Street to the corner of Radcliffe Street and Green Lane. 

## Calling All History Buffs!



At 7 p.m. on Tuesday, August 22, at BCHF headquarters, the Grundy Library, in collaboration with BCHF will host author Michael C. Harris as he discusses his latest non-fiction book entitled "The Philadelphia Campaign 1777-78" and released this past June. Mr. Harris is a graduate of the University of Mary Washington and the American Military University. He has worked for the National Park Service in Fredericksburg, VA, Fort Mott State Park, NJ, and the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission at the Brandywine Battlefield in Chadds Ford, PA.

In addition to his latest non-fiction book, Mr. Harris has authored two other American Revolution books entitled "Brandywine: A Military History of the Battle that Lost Philadelphia but Saved America, September 11, 1777" and "Germantown: A Military History of the Battle for Philadelphia, October 4, 1777." #### Did You Ever Swim At The Arch?

The arch was built in 1910. It was under the main railroad through Bristol.


The water came from Silver Lake and then Otter Creek and would flow to the Delaware River.

The swimming was through the arch opposite the present Commerce Park shopping center.

Under the arch was a platform on which there was a heater. That was to warm the trough above the arch where steam engines could take on water as they passed. In warmer weather there was no problem but in winter they needed to keep ice from the troughs.

Nearby were barracks during World War II occupied by soldiers and later Mexicans brought to work on the railroad. Steam engines, while still in transit, could take on water as a scoop was dropped into a trough.

Many young people enjoyed the water. It was not deep and this writer recalls a steam engine stopped above the arch and the engineer, on a hot summer day, came down the bank and jumped in the water after he removed his shoes. His clothing would dry once he was back in the steam engine.



There were many young people who enjoyed the cool water in summer.

I doubt that the arch is used for swimming today.

# **Out Of The Past**

The following items were excerpted from **June 1903** issues of THE BUCKS COUNTY GAZETTE. Price Three Cents.

Please note: There were only two issues for June 1903 on microfilm at the Grundy Library.

6/4 – A PROSPEROUS CLUB. The Catholic Club of Bristol has given out contracts for the refurnishing of its rooms at St. Mark's Parochial building on Radcliffe Street. The Catholic Club is the oldest social organization in Bristol, having had a successful existence for fourteen years. It has a membership of over one hundred young men.

FIRST COAL BY CANAL. The first boatload of coal that has been shipped from Mauch Chunk via the Delaware Division Canal since December 1901 was consigned to W. F. Leedom, the Bath Street dealer, on Thursday, May 28. This has been followed by additional shipments.

"FRANK G. RISLEY wishes to announce to his numerous patrons and friends that he has opened for the season with **Ice Cream and Soda Water**. Strawberry ice cream made from fresh strawberries. Ice cream soda, flavored with genuine crushed fruit, 5 cents. Mill and Pond Streets."

"A branch of The New Fiction Library, New York City, has been established at the stationery and newspaper store of J. K. STREEPER & SON, 207 Mill Street. Yearly subscription, \$1.50; subscription tickets 6 for 25c."

#### LOCAL INTELLIGENCE:

During the dry weather, the trolley stirs up a cloud of dust on Radcliffe and Mill Streets and so provoked have become the annoyed housekeepers, the subject is being agitated of petitioning council to limit the rate of speed with which the cars go through Bristol, unless the streets are sprinkled in some manner.

The Board of Health has issued its annual notice to property owners and tenants calling attention to its sections of Rules and Regulations adopted by the Board and approved by the Burgess and council, which require the occupants of every house within the limits of the borough to cleanse the cellars of all dirt, vegetable and impure matter calculated to engender disease and to cause them to be thoroughly white-washed with fresh lime at least once a year, prior to June 15. The health officer is required to visit every house in the borough at least once a year and investigate the sanitary condition thereof.

Failure to comply with the regulations causes liability to a fine of ten dollars.

6/11 — COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES. The commencement exercises of the Bristol High School will take place in the assembly room of the high school building on Tuesday evening, June 23, at 7:45 o'clock. There are five members of the graduating class of '03: Misses Florence Marshall, May Raylman and Mattie Robinson; Earl Brown and William Pike.

FERRY BOAT STRANDED. While returning from Burlington last Thursday night on a special trip with a theatre party, the ferry William E. Doran got stranded on the sand bar between Bristol and Burlington. Help had to be summoned from the Jersey town to take the passengers home in row boats. The night was damp and foggy and, as the ladies were gowned in filmy costumes, considerable distress was caused. It was two o'clock in the morning before the party reached Bristol.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING. An adjourned meeting of the Bristol school board was held on Monday evening when an organization was perfected for the new year. The school tax was fixed the same as last year, at fifty cents on the hundred dollars valuation. It was decided to ask the Bristol dealers for proposals for 125 gross of egg coal.

The Liberty Cornet Band and the Tiptop Glee Club will entertain. Excellent Dance Music. Steamer Columbia will leave Bristol at 8 p.m., Burlington at 8:15 p.m. and Beverly at 8:30 p.m. Tickets 50 cents. Children under 12, accompanied by parents or guardians, free."

C. C. Strumfels has a big ad in this week's paper calling attention to the famous "Bill Dugan" 5c cigar.


