## Honoring Anna Bono Larrisey: A Steady Hand on BCHF's Finances

When the Bristol Cultural and Historical Foundation talks about “keeping the lights on” for our building, programs, events, and preservation work, there’s one name that quietly appears behind the scenes again and again: **Anna Bono Larrisey**.

For many years, Anna has served as Treasurer of the Bristol Cultural and Historical Foundation, carefully stewarding the organization’s finances so that our mission—to preserve and celebrate the rich history of Bristol Borough—could thrive. In this role, she has done far more than balance a checkbook. She has helped ensure that every house tour, exhibit, talk, scholarship, and community program had the financial foundation it needed to succeed.

## A Community Hospital

Anyone new to Bristol within the last thirty years might be surprised to learn that it once had its own fully operational, modern, inpatient hospital. It was a community hospital in all senses: conceived of and championed by one of Bristol's long-serving physicians, reliant on volunteer help from members of the community, and offering full patient and laboratory services for the care of people in Bristol.

Apart from newbies like me, many of our members will remember the Delaware Valley Hospital on Wilson Avenue that operated from 1960 to 1993. It was a community-focused, accredited hospital with eighty beds and twelve bassinets. There were over three thousand admissions yearly. The hospital had an auxiliary and three guilds with over eighty volunteers. The feeling was that it was truly part of the community due to its structure as a 'non-profit' entity and its location in the heart of Bristol. In time, the hospital expanded to include interns and residents for training... even a cardiology fellowship in conjunction with Deborah Heart and Lung Center.

Dr. Julius Sobel was the president of the hospital's board of directors and the key motivator in the hospital's origin as he gathered like-minded physicians to join. The Delaware Valley Hospital occupied a building that had served as a hospital in the community of Harriman. In May of 1960, a groundbreaking ceremony (picture, Dr. Sobel on the extreme right) marked the start of construction of an addition to the newly reformed and renamed hospital. In the late 1960s, an additional four-

story addition was made to the structure as well as internal renovations. These changes ensured that the hospital was at the forefront of medical technology and equipped to manage all aspects of modern medical care.

Dr. Sobel, who had graduated from the Philadelphia College of Osteopathy in 1934, opened his medical office at 413 Mill Street two years later in 1936. Dr. Sobel served the growing Bristol community in general practice and obstetrics for many years before his involvement in the establishment of the Delaware Valley Hospital. In addition to his efforts toward the growth of the hospital, Dr. Sobel was the founder and chief of the division of Proctology all

while maintaining his private practice. In an aside, Dr. Sobel's wife, Anna Sobel, was the president of the auxiliary and deeply involved with fund-raising including the very popular Fall Carnival held on the hospital grounds.

Unfortunately, all good things come to an end. Dr. Sobel died in November of 1978. He was honored by his many patients, the community he served, and his colleagues. Despite the best efforts of the doctors and the involvement of the community, times changed and Delaware Valley Hospital closed its operation in Bristol in 1993. It was a hardship for the community in terms of the loss of jobs and of the personal care that the community hospital provided.

## Bristol Puerto Rican History and Archive Initiative Presentation

This fall Joel Berrocal, a resident of the borough, and Abigail Duffany, the archivist at the Grundy Foundation, presented highlights of the Bristol Puerto Rican History and Archive Initiative. Since the 1950s, Puerto Rican families have made significant contributions to shaping the culture and community of Bristol, Pennsylvania. Today, more than 1,100 Puerto Rican residents call Bristol home, but very little of their history is represented in the town's archival collections.

Mr. Berrocal and Ms. Duffany invite residents to share photographs, documents, keepsakes, and personal stories to help preserve Puerto Rican history in Bristol for future generations.

Your contributions will become part of a new public digital collection in the Grundy Archive. You keep your original materials and receive free digital copies of everything we scan or record. With your permission, materials may also be used in exhibits, publications, or community programs. All materials will be handled with care, and all descriptions will be developed in collaboration with contributors to ensure cultural respect and accuracy.
