TWO BY LAND & TWO BY SEA

On Wednesday, October 1, we're off by bus for a guided tour of Eckley Miners' Village in Weatherly, PA, followed by a three-course lunch at the Inn at Jim Thorpe and some free time. Visiting Eckley is like stepping back into the gritty, yet fascinating, world of 19th-century anthracite coal mining. The site is now run as a museum, with an indoor and outdoor component, by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission. Buildings that are part of the museum include: the Immaculate Conception Church (1861), three "slate pickers' houses" (1854), larger laborers' dwellings (1854), St. James Episcopal Church (1859), mine bosses' houses (1860), and the doctor's office (1874). "The Molly Maguires," a 1970 film, was filmed in Eckley and resulted in the town's being saved from demolition. The all-inclusive cost is \$128 for BCHF members; \$138 for non-members. Next up is a bus trip on Thursday, December 4, to Tarrytown, NJ, for a tour and hot buffet luncheon at the magnificent Lyndhurst Mansion, which will be all decked out in holiday splendor. USA Today described it as one of the "Ten Best Historic Holiday Tours." The mansion sits on its own 67-acre park beside the Hudson River, and is one of America's finest Gothic Revival mansions. The all-inclusive cost is \$158 for BCHF members; \$168 for non-members. Reservation deadline is **Friday, Oct. 31**, unless sold out prior. A Faithful Head Nurse: Florence Ritchie

She worked in the "Private Hospital" of Dr. J. Fred Wagner

Florence lived at 405 Jefferson Avenue as an adult.

The family home was at 560 Swain St. Her father and sister and brother-in-law Anna and Jim Hughes lived there.

The building originally belonged to the Slack family. It was located at the corner of Radcliffe and Franklin Streets. Dr. J. Fred Wagner and his wife Jennie used it for their home. They decided to make it a private hospital. It would be the first private hospital in Bristol Borough.


Wagner was a veteran of World War I. He was commissioned a Major in November 1918. Wagner had fought in the Argonne Forest.

Dr. Wagner decided to close the hospital in 1945 and moved to Connecticut. He asked Florence Ritchie to move to Connecticut to care for him in his declining years. While Florence was in Connecticut she met, a man and they were married.

When Dr. Wagner died, his body was brought to Bristol and interred in the Friends (Quaker) cemetery along Wood Street in 1946.

Florence his head nurse was in Bristol for the funeral and returned to Connecticut with her husband.

A hospital was built in Harriman on Wilson Avenue which was for the Shipyard along the Delaware River. In 1923 Harriman became a part of Bristol Borough.



The former Wagner hospital is presently an apartment building.

Bristol has no hospital in the borough at the present time. The closest hospital is Lower Bucks Hospital in Bristol Township on Bath Road opposite Silver Lake Park.

Florence Ritchie was a faithful head nurse.

OUT OF THE PAST

The following items were excerpted from the Bristol Courier September 1925. Price 2¢

September 1 – School opened for the 1925-26 school year with a record number of students.

September 2 – At the regular meeting of the school Board they discussed the overcrowding at the Wood St. school and the high school. The voters will decide the issue of high school expansion in November.

Also at that meeting Dr. George T. Fox offered Harri-man Hospital and physicians for surgery to remove tonsils and adenoids for a number of students.

A booze shipment via railroad was found in the yard of the Eddington Lumber and Supply Co. The rail car was supposed to be a shipment of asbestos roofing. Railroad detectives and prohibition men flocked to the scene.

September 3 – The Shenandoah, a giant dirigible, broke in two and crashed while flying over Ohio in a big storm with 13 killed and 19 injured.

American Store on Farragut Ave. advertised Butter @ 55¢/ lb., Coffee @ 42¢/lb., Sirloin Steak 50¢/lb.

September 4 – Bristol School District received \$10,377 as its share of the state school appropriation. Funds go toward teacher salaries.

Philadelphia Suburban Gas and Electric Co. advertised: Receive \$1 for any old iron. September 10th is the last day to trade in your old iron on a “Wrinkle Proof Universal Iron”, The iron with a switch to turn on or off. Price is \$6.75 less the dollar for your old iron.

September 5 – St. Ann’s new Parochial School located on Logan St to be dedicated on Mon. Sept. 7. There are 8 classrooms measuring 22 Ft. X 34 Ft. with seating for 50 pupils per room. Designed and built by Angelo Di Renzo.

September 8 – New Colonial Theatre grand

re-opening tonight featuring Tom Mix in *Riders of the Purple Sage* based on Zane Grey’s novel. Adults 15¢, children 10¢.

September 9 – Pennsylvania Rail Road offers a One Day excursion to the Delaware Water Gap and Stroudsburg from Bristol on Sun. Sept. 13 Cost \$3.00 round trip.

September 10 - Women’s Christian Temperance Union to hold a convention in their hall in Dolington on Sat. Sept. 12.

September 11 – Dries Furniture Store: French Walnut 10-Piece Dining Room Suite on Sale - \$145.00, regularly \$275.00. Cash or Credit.

September 14 – Thieves broke into St. Charles Church in Cornwells and stole from the poor boxes and took candlesticks. Much damage was done.

September 15 – Primary Election for local offices held today. A large turnout is expected. 800 voted shortly before noon.

Lucky Strike Cigarettes advertised – Win more friends-- 50 Lucky Strikes Tax Free. Regular price 40¢.

September 19 – Navy speed king, Lieutenant Williams, breaks all records – flying 5 miles a minute. This plane will be flown in the air races on Long Island Oct. 8 -10.

Many scenes are being filmed for a local movie. The film “*Who’s Who & What’s What*” in Bristol will feature: Amisson and Sons Potteries and the T. B. Harkin Foundry.

September 21 – Historians gathered Sat and Sun. to take part in ceremonies and dedication of 2 more markers place along the famous Indian Walk of a day and a half from Wrightstown to near Mauch Chunk in Carbon County. PA Historical Commission and Northampton County Historic and Genealogical Society place these signs.

September 22 – Grange exhibit to feature County Fair. Cash prizes will be offered for the best exhibits.

Dedication of the new school at Beaver and Spring St. in the 4th Ward will be held on Oct. 10th. The building is a gift from Mr. Angelo DiRenzo and the ground by Mr. Joseph Grundy.

September 29 – A petition is circulating to divide the 6th Ward into 2 precincts. East of Garfield St. will be the 2nd Precinct and West of Garfield will be the 1st.
